### "STATIC-99" Questions Start Here

The following questions are used to score Static-99, a measure of recidivism risk for sexual offenders based on static, historical factors. The information used to score Static-99 is based on three sources: personal demographic information (2 questions), official criminal history (5 questions) and the gender and relationship to victims (3 questions).

#### **Criminal History Information**

The next five items are based on official criminal history records. Consequently, the following sections provide an opportunity to review the official records.

If the criminal history is short you may wish to just write in the offences here - or you may wish to work from a photocopy of the criminal record.

### **Criminal history continued**

#### **Identify the Index offence**

The Index Offence is the most recent sex offence. It could be a charge, conviction or parole/probation violation. Sometimes index offences include multiple counts, multiple victims, and numerous crimes perpetrated at different times. This is because the offender may not have been detected and apprehended when they first began to offend. Also, historical offences that are detected after the offender is convicted of a more recent sexual offence would be considered part of the index offence.

Refers to convictions for non-sexual assault that are dealt with on the same sentencing occasion as the index sex offence. These convictions can involve the same victim as the index sex offence or they can involve a different victim. All non-sexual violence convictions are included providing they were dealt with on the same sentencing occasion as the index sex offences. Example offences would include murder, wounding, assault causing bodily harm, assault, robbery, pointing a firearm, arson, and threatening.

Count the number of prior charges and convictions for sexual offences. Count each separate charge and conviction. For example, if an offender was charged with 5 counts of sexual assault, count all five charges. The score is based on the total number of charges or the total number of convictions, whichever produces the highest score. For determining whether a charge/conviction is sexual, consider the behaviour involved. A Break and Enter conviction should be considered sexual if the intent of the Break and Enter was to obtain access to potential rape victims.

Count the number of distinct occasions on which the offender has been sentenced for criminal offences of any kind. The number of charges/convictions does not matter, only the number of sentencing dates. Court appearances that resulted in complete acquittal are not counted. The index sentencing date is not included.

This category includes convictions for non-contact sexual offences, such as exhibitionism, possessing obscene material, obscene telephone calls, and voyeurism. Self-reported offences do not count in this category, nor do prostitution related offences.

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#### **Victim Description**

The next three questions are based on victim characteristics. Victim information can come from any reliable source, including child welfare records, psychiatric records and self-report. It includes but is not restricted to the victims identified in the official criminal history.

In the area below describe each of the offender's victims in terms of gender, relationship to the victim and age. An example is provided below. In this case the victim was a 13-year-old female who was a niece of the offender. In the gender and the relationship to victim sections simply circle the correct response. If you have an exact or approximate age please write that age, in years, on the line provided. If you do not have an exact or approximate age please circle your best guess: "Child (0 - 12)", "Teen (13 - 17), or "Adult (18 or older)".

A related victim is one where the relationship would be sufficiently close that marriage would normally be prohibited, such as parent, uncle, grandparent, or stepsister. A victim is considered to be a stranger if the victim did not know the offender 24 hours before the offence.

If you don't have all the information, fill in what you know.
